

- This activity will help you identify and discuss some of the issues that may occur when using technology and communicating online.

1 Let's get started

- As a family, watch the Australian Government film [Act eSafe](#).
- As you watch, make notes about the important e-security and e-safety issues that are raised in the animation, especially in relation to online communication.

Tip: Feel free to stop the video as you watch it and talk about what is happening.



2 Let's get started

- As a family, think and talk about how you use technology at home.
- Brainstorm some of the potential problems that may arise when online. You might like to include the following topics in your conversation:
 - Social networking
 - Privacy
 - Balancing time online
 - Online gaming
- Discuss what you could do if you encountered a problem, especially an ethical dilemma, and who you could talk to about the issue.

An ethical dilemma: What's that?

- An ethical dilemma is the need to choose from two options, neither of which solves the situation in an ethical way.
- An example of an ethical dilemma is:
 - You come across money sticking out of an ATM but there is no one around. Is it right to take the money?
- Technology-related examples include:
 - Plagiarism
 - Online privacy
 - Real-time satellite surveillance video
 - Wearable technology
